MINUTES OF GENERAL MEETING NOV. 11, 1978 CENTER FOR PUPPETRY ARTS

At 2:00 P.M. the Guild enjoyed a performence of UNCLE REMUS stories by the Vagabond Marionettes at the Puppet Center. The suditrium was filled to overflowing. After a demonstration of their puppets, a general meeting of A.S.P.G. was called to order by the President, Barbara Goltz.

The minutes of the previous meeting were dispensed with. The tressurers report by Bill Price state \$823.96 balance in account. Andy Bremer, membership chairman announced 60 members on roster. The President read a letter from Conrad Productions relative to six puppetry worksheets for \$6.00. More information can be obtained from the president. Pegg Callahan has donated many back issues of the Puppetry Journal. A committee was formed with John Guerin as chairman to start a puppetry library.

Vincent Anthony explained that the Puppetry Center could be a booking agent for puppet artists. A committee on quality control of performances was formed with Fegg Callahan, John Cooper, Mary Smith and Barbara Goltz. Vincent moved and Carol Daniel seconded that the committee should be the deciding factor on quality control.

Carol Daniel, chairman of the Puppet Festival at Colony Square in December brought an update on the plans. The Regional Festival was then discussed. A mime workshop was given by Sandra Hughes and Michael Hickey. Refreshments were followed by a performance by Alan Sugar. Ruth Gilpin, Sec.

ACCRESIFUL SEASON WITH THERUN BICHEART?"

Carol and Ken Daniel have announced that their company, Piccadilly Puppets, has received grants from the Georgia Council for the Arts and Humenties and the National Endowment for the Arts for the third consecutive year. The grants will enable them to perform their new show, FERLIN BIGHEART AND THE STOLEN YOUEL CAPER for school audiences throughout Georgia. Carol reports that they have received splendid reviews wherever they have appeared with the new show thus far.

The story begins at the home of Buford Chainsaw, notorious crum and ex-Country and Western singing ster. Buford is conspiring with Festis Q. Curl, a snake of dubious credentials, and R.C., his evil minded agent, to get rid of Ferlin Bigheert. It seems that Ferlin has taken Buford's place as the Number One Super Star of country music. Buford had geined his popularity by singing songs that made everyone mean and nasty. For a while it looked like the whole world would soon be fighting. That is, until Ferlin Bigheart came along with all his happy, joyful yodeling, and Buford was reduced to a 'has been.' Buford demands that Festis and R. C. capture Ferlin so that Buford can regain his stature as the Number One Super Star.

Meanwhile, back at the Music Hall, Wanda Doowright, president of the Ferlin Bigheart Fan Club, has just introduced Ferlin to his audience. As he begins to sing, Festis and R. C. grab our hero and take him to Buford's hideaway. Once there, Buford insists that Festis put a spell on Ferlin so that he will never be able to yodel again. Festis, who has never cast a successful spell on anyone, creates a 'magic' phrase just to make Buford happy. With that, Buford leaves for the Country Music Hall of Stars to take Ferlin's place, leaving Festis to guard Ferlin. While Festis is watching over Ferlin, Wanda arrives and gains entrance by convincing Festis that she is giving away free samples of his favorite ice cream. Whereupon, Wanda threatens to tie Festis in knots for treating her hero in such a way.

Festis soon sees the error of his ways. But, alas, poor Ferlin can't yodel, and it seems that Buford will soon have everyone acting mean and nasty again. There is just one possibility to save the day...the world's most famous yodeler, now retired, Bubba Lee Ray Puckett, who lives in the hills nearby. Ferlin calls on Bubba Lee and, after some fast talking, convinces him that he needs help to find his lost yodel. Bubba Lee finally agrees to help Ferlin and gives him some of his special brew. With that, Ferlin rushes back to the Music Hall just as Buford is prepared

to sing. But Ferlin still cannot yodel. Just as it seems that all is lost, wands cells on the sudience to help Ferlin. Of course, all ends well for everyone, that is, except for Buford and R.C.

Although the story is mainly for the entertainment of its audience, it also reinforces the value of confidence and illustrates how we are affected by the positive and negative influences in our lives.

We wish Carol and Ken every success with this new show. Carol will be having to leave the show after Christmas as she is expecting the arrival of a new baby in February. She is looking for a good puppeteer as a replacement. Any interested puppeteers should contact her at 636-0022.



TLANTA PUPPET THEATRE

"A SHOW OF HANDS" began performances in Columbia, S. C. at the Art Museum on November 6th. Performed by members of the Junior League, the show is designed to educate and awaken the imaginations of the audience concerning the art of simple puppetry.

A life-sized MR. PUNCH (harrassed by his wife, JUDY) emcees furthyme -- a first on the part of the author. With lively original music, the show uses bare hands, finger puppets, rods, hand and mouth puppets and a marionette. The Country Cloggers are show stoppers as well as the quartet of mouth puppet monsters (including a DRACULA), singing "You Can Be A Puppeteer". In the finale, the curtain is removed and the audience is treated to a view of puppeteers in action.

The puppets were designed and constructed by Lynne Farris. The studio-produced sound track includes voices by Gary Gue, Bert Elliott, Lynne Parris and Pegg Callahan and studio musicians Elliott, Tom Grose and Lenny Balistreri. (Lynne and Pegg also played piano).
