



After the news, the guild meeting continued with a wonderful program on directing the puppet theatre, which was given by Lee Bryan and Gregg Wallace. Several members commented that the program reminded them of how meetings used to be with informative, useful programs! This writer thinks this is a sign of times to come as our guild grows stronger and stronger.

Some notes on the program:

A director is an important part of any puppet production because he/she is a person who can give an objective eye allowing you to collaborate and span new ideas that you may not think of on your own. The director is also a person who can give valuable input regarding sets, costumes, and rehearsal choices.

There are ways to direct a puppet show without hiring an actual director. Gregg and Lee explained

the problems with each of them.

You can use a mirror, but you run the risk of getting too attached to using one and having difficulty when you make the switch to a live audience. Also, Gregg explained that in theatre there is a natural flow of action from left to right. Using a mirror reverses that natural flow, and distorts the image you see vs. what the audience actually sees. (It was very clear when Gregg explained it, I assure you.)

You also have the option of using videotape. Lee and Gregg prefer to have an outside eye watching the actual live performance. However, a videotape can be very useful for polishing the show during later rehearsals, and a videotape of a final performance is an invaluable reference tool when it comes time to remount a show that's been sitting in storage for a

couple of years.

Lee and Gregg feel that hiring a director will help you actually finish a show. Booking a show can help you finish as well. A rule of thumb when working with a director is that it takes one hour of rehearsal

time for each minute of performance time. A few more tips: read your script through from each character's point of view, always be very specific when directing, and follow the rule of doing things in threes (three times) so that the audience has time to grasp what's happening.

They finished the program by giving members of the guild directing exercises while Lee performed with puppets. Also, Lee and Gregg suggested a good book, <u>Directing Puppet Theatre</u>, by Carol Fijan and

Frank Ballard.

Don't you wish you'd attended the last guild meeting? We hope to see you at the next one on June 13.
